The Zohar and other source texts strive to experience the Divine source through four categories of flows, what Dr. McCrensky defines as receiving C. H. E. R. The C flows are receivable forces that enable mankind to serve as creation-partners in ongoing creation. The H represents the reception of holiness, enabling one to feel holy and experience the presence of God. The E stands for ethics, reception of the ability to determine right from wrong and to make ethical choices. The R is the Divine flow representing revelation, the ability to draw in new insight, discovery, ideas, understanding and wisdom. Jewish study, prayer and ritual enable kabbalists to become more balanced, ethical, holy partners in continuing creation and betterment of the world (tikun olam). But Judaism has lost the symbolism and meaning of both prayer and practice during the past three hundred years. In a generation after 18th century rabbis forbid the study of Kabbalah until the age of 40 due to fear of false messiahs, the kabbalistic meaning of most Jewish rituals became lost. This book strives to restore and revitalize Jewish spirituality by re-discovering the kabbalistic meaning of Jewish ceremonies, services and symbols.

His hope was that the *Qol Qore*, written in Hebrew and translated into French, German, and Polish, would reach Jewish and Christian audiences alike, urging each to consider the validity of the other's religious principles. In an era characterized by fractious debates between Jewish communities, Elijah Soloveitchik represents a voice that called for radical unity amongst Jews and Christians alike.
